The Bucks' Blog

One of the great truths of the Bible is: human nature is consistent down through the ages. It never changes. That's why God's Word will always apply. Our passage from Philippians today proves the point. There was conflict in the church in Philippi between two women leaders in the church... over 2,000 years ago.

I submit to you that most churches in America today are at one of three conditions in their congregation: They are either in the midst of

conflict, coming out of conflict, or about to go into conflict. Why is that true? Because human nature never changes.

What or who comes to your mind first, when I say *conflict*? When I looked up synonyms, the list was huge. Conflict, in some form, seems to be everywhere. And, it's not just in the church.

If you've ever attended a city council meeting, a home-owners' association meeting, a parent-teacher's meeting, a board of education meeting, and the list goes on... you know that conflict is everywhere.

Did you know a person can be in conflict with themselves? Internal, personal, conflict can become so great that it can become paralyzing. The conflict of the mind. I read a quote the other day: "Our life is shaped by our mind." Mental conflict.

Then there's our families... now don't pretend. Every family has one or two that just seem to love conflict whenever the family gets together. They're the one(s) that somewhere toward the end of the dinner, will bring up religion, politics, or why a certain relative is still unemployed or about to get another divorce. We've all been there. Family conflict. And some families never get over it and die in their conflict.

And then, there's conflict in the community of friends. Something happens and two people who had been friends for years suddenly stop talking with each other. It's as if they never knew each other.

And of course, in the last few years, our nation has become a hotbed of conflict. It's as if everyone is on the lookout for conflict somewhere, and is ready to maim, shoot, or kill to resolve it.

What is conflict... really? And it's causes? I submit to you the root of conflict is fear... Fear of losing control, fear of change, fear of loss of independence... it comes from selfishness, pride, sense of privilege, and ego.

And conflict, unfortunately, has become standard fare in the church today... just as it was in the church in Philippi. <u>Eu(h)odia</u> and <u>Syntche</u> were leaders in the church and were at odds with each other; so much so that it was affecting the entire church... probably a home church. Some scholars believe the conflict came from what it meant to truly be a follower of Jesus.

Paul, in prison in Rome, wanted to be with them to resolve the issue himself, but couldn't. So he asked <u>Syzygus</u>, probably the pastor of the church, to intervene.

It hurt Paul's heart to know that these two women who had been in the trenches of promoting the Gospel of Christ along with him and Clement were now severely at odds.

Paul said that the conflict was damaging to the example they were to give of the love of Christ to the non-believers in Philippi and to the members of the church. And in verse 5, Paul says (nrsv) let your "gentleness" be known to

everyone. That word gentleness can also be translated from the greek as moderation, be on their side, forbearance, or reasonableness. All of them come to one conclusion: They are an antidote to fear, anxiety, or worry.

And Paul says right before in verse 4... Rejoice! always! Rejoice! Is he crazy?! Rejoice In the midst of conflict? Yes. That's it.

And then, right after, in verse 6, he says to pray about everything and not to worry about anything. Really? Yup.

As I studied for this message, I pondered... if Paul were to come to your church... your church in the middle of, coming out of, or going into conflict. What if he came to our church? Into our conflict? What would Paul do or say? Or more importantly, what would we say or do?

I think Paul would say...

"Friends, take a step back. Take a deep breath. You're better than this. It's not about you or your families or your 40+ years of whatever it is that's driving you. It's about the body of Christ and being part of the building of the living church. We are, each one of us, living stones with very rough edges being put together into the living church. And most times, when stones with rough edges are put too close to other stones with rough edges, it can get very irritating. And things can get testy. And we get so caught up in our irritation and conflict that we find ourselves drained of any energy to be examples of the love of Christ in the community. And those signs about loving our neighbors, on the front of our church, become indictments against us; because, the community can see that we don't even love each other.

And Paul would say to ALL of us, Pastor and congregation alike, it's past time. Put away all this foolishness. Be gentle and forbearing with

one another, and let's get on with building the living church, the body of Christ.

My friends, my brothers and sisters, we can do this.

I believe the Holy Spirit showed me something as I prepared this message. God wants to do something special in this community of faith... and He wants to do it with me and with you together. And God is waiting for us to put aside our petty irritations so that we can receive what is in store for us. But it's going to require letting go... letting go of anything that hinders God's moving... and being gentle.

I will close with this:

I have a friend from Florida... She and her husband, Bob, are faithful members of First Presbyterian Church, Sarasota, Fl.

Her name is Jane Barr, Executive Coach, who promotes the growth of women leaders in technology.

She relates this story...

When I was in junior high school my favorite clothing for after school and weekends was a cast-off men's blue shirt from my older brother and a pair of white denim cutoff shorts. Much to my mother's chagrin I wore that outfit wherever I could. I loved the feel of that shirt, the softness, the ease. I wore it practically thread bare.

At some point I grew several inches and those clothes no longer fit. I hung on to them as long as I could but even I could recognize that it was time to give them up. Whether it's physical clothes, a mindset or perhaps a job, we all experience things that we love, yet know we have grown beyond.

What might you be clinging to that it's time for you to let go"

Friends, are you willing to let go of what's keeping you from enjoying, together, what God has in store for us?

Great things are going to happen today.

God is ready to move! Let's get going!

Jesus forgave me of all my sins, paying a horrendous cost for my salvation. In turn, I'm commanded to forgive, so I can receive forgiveness from my heavenly Father. Sunday School is back in session every Sunday following worship service.




Youth Group is now meeting every Wednesday at 6:30 P.M.
