The Session met on Tuesday, November 19th, 2024 at 6:30 p.m. with the following summary of the meeting:


- A grant was received from the Lamport Foundation for the roof project. Several loads of tiles have been picked up by Garlock-French Company.

Advent has spawned many traditions over the centuries since the birth of Christ. These include setting up and decorating a Christmas tree, an exchange of gifts, putting together a nativity scene, serious baking of regional or cultural sweets, the singing of

carols, keeping an Advent calendar and more. One ritual that has a long history is the lighting of Advent candles. But the arrangement of the candles into a wreath is relatively recent. According to one source, Johann Wichern created the first Advent wreath in 1839. He took a decrepit cartwheel and fastened 20 red and four white candles on it. With 24 days leading up to Christmas Day, Wichern lit a new red candle on each weekday of December and a new white candle on each Sunday service, finally lighting the last white candle on Christmas Eve. Thus started the tradition of the Advent wreath now observed by many churches today. The wreath today has four candles, usually purple (except for the third candle which is pink) and they stand for HOPE, PEACE, JOY, LOVE. In the center of the wreath is a larger, white candle which is known as the CHRIST candle and it is lighted on **Christmas Eve or Christmas Dav. December 1st is the First Sunday of** Advent, and the purple candle stands for HOPE. It is also known as the "prophecy candle" because it reminds us of the hope that God will fulfill the prophecies declared in the Old Testament about Jesus. It reminds us that in a world often clouded by uncertainty and darkness, this tiny flame serves as a beacon of light, illuminating our path and filling our hearts with anticipation. Hope is not merely

wishful thinking or blind optimism. It is a powerful force that sustains us in times of despair and guides us through the darkest of nights. It is the assurance that better days are ahead, even when the present seems bleak. The first candle of Advent symbolizes this hope — a hope rooted in the promise of a Savior who brings light into the world. Just as this candle dispels the shadows around us, so, too, does Christ dispel the darkness of sin and despair, offering us a renewed sense of purpose and direction. As we journey through this season of Advent, let us hold fast to the hope that Christ offers us. For in him, we find the promise of redemption, restoration and everlasting joy. Amen. —Timothy Merrill
